



A Worship Study Guide for Individuals, Groups and Families: For the week of February 11, 2018

Note to Discussion Leaders: Have members read the Bible passage in the group meeting. This is a "worship discussion" guide, and our reflections and applications are grounded in Scripture. Read through this guide before meeting with the group. You do <u>not</u> need to work through the whole guide. Decide which points would be most helpful for the time of meeting together, and use them as a starting point for your time together.

Numbers 15:1-21 "When You Come Into The Land"

• How do you know God is faithful?

¹ The LORD spoke to Moses, saying, ² "Speak to the people of Israel and say to them, When you come into the land you are to inhabit, which I am giving you,

• Numbers 13-14 gives the account of one of the lowest points of Israel's unbelief and rebellion toward The LORD. How is God's amazing grace reflected in these first verses of chapter 15?

³ and you offer to the LORD from the herd or from the flock a food offering or a burnt offering or a sacrifice, to fulfill a vow or as a freewill offering or at your appointed feasts, to make a pleasing aroma to the LORD, ⁴ then he who brings his offering shall offer to the LORD a grain offering of a tenth of an ephah of fine flour, mixed with a quarter of a hin of oil; ⁵ and you shall offer with the burnt offering, or for the sacrifice, a quarter of a hin of wine for the drink offering for each lamb. ⁶ Or for a ram, you shall offer for a grain offering two tenths of an ephah of fine flour mixed with a third of a hin of oil. ⁷ And for the drink offering you shall offer a third of a hin of wine, a pleasing aroma to the LORD. ⁸ And when you offer a bull as a burnt offering or sacrifice, to fulfill a vow or for peace offerings to the LORD, ⁹ then one shall offer with the bull a grain offering of three tenths of an ephah of fine flour, mixed with half a hin of oil. ¹⁰ And you shall offer for the drink offering half a hin of wine, as a food offering, a pleasing aroma to the LORD.

¹¹ "Thus it shall be done for each bull or ram, or for each lamb or young goat. ¹² As many as you offer, so shall you do with each one, as many as there are. ¹³ Every native Israelite shall do these things in this way, in offering a food offering, with a pleasing aroma to the LORD. ¹⁴ And if a stranger is sojourning with you, or anyone is living permanently among you, and he wishes to offer a food offering, with a pleasing aroma to the LORD, he shall do as you do. ¹⁵ For the assembly, there shall be one statute for you and for the stranger who sojourns with you, a statute forever throughout your generations. You and the sojourner shall be alike before the LORD. ¹⁶ One law and one rule shall be for you and for the stranger who sojourns with you."

¹⁷ The LORD spoke to Moses, saying, ¹⁸ "Speak to the people of Israel and say to them, When you come into the land to which I bring you ¹⁹ and when you eat of the bread of the land, you shall present a contribution to the LORD. ²⁰ Of the first of your dough you shall present a loaf as a contribution; like a contribution from the threshing floor, so shall you present it. ²¹ Some of the first of your dough you shall give to the LORD as a contribution throughout your generations.

- The LORD looked forward to worship in the Promised Land. The land was rich and flowing with "milk and honey". And worship would testify to God's abundant and generous provision.
 - The sacrifices of worship would be "an aroma pleasing to LORD" (3, 7, 10, 13, & 14). What does that mean?
 - o The offerings of worship would be "fine", "first" and "best" (4, 6, 9, 20 & 21). Why?
 - The worship gatherings God described included Israelites, sojourners, and strangers (13-16). Why is this significant?

- o **Worship also involved "contributions" (17**-20). What was the purpose of these contributions? Read Numbers 18:12-13 for more insight.
- On Sunday, we sang <u>Come To The Feast</u>, a wonderful meditation on <u>Luke 14:12-24</u> and Jesus vision of our entering the Promised Land. What pleasing & best contribution does The LORD Himself ultimately bring to worship? What do we bring to Him in worship? Who is involved in worship?
- **Sunday's Words of Encouragement came to use from Romans 5:1-2**. Read that passage aloud as a group to begin a time of prayer together.
