# A Worship Study Guide for Individuals, Groups and Families for the week of April 7, 2019

## Restore

This week, Steve Shelby preached on Psalm 126.

<ul> <li><sup>1</sup> When the LORD restored the fortunes of Zion, we were like those who dream.</li> <li><sup>2</sup> Then our mouth was filled with laughter, and our tongue with shouts of joy;</li> </ul>	<ul> <li><sup>4</sup> Restore our fortunes, O LORD, like streams in the Negeb!</li> <li><sup>5</sup> Those who sow in tears shall reap with shouts of joy!</li> </ul>
"The LORD has done great things for us;	<sup>6</sup> He who goes out weeping, bearing the seed for sowing, shall come home with shouts of joy,
we are glad.	bringing his sheaves with him.

- We don't fully know the context of Psalm 126. It could be written about deliverance from captivity, siege, famine, or any number of troubles. It really is paradigm for much of the life of God's people.
- The Psalm is divided into two parts: Joy Remembered (1-3) & Joy Requested in Hope (4-6)
- Joy Remembered
  - Memory of the Lord's grace, goodness and mercy are always drivers of joy. Particularly, memories of how we have been delivered. When this is fresh on our minds and hearts, nothing is sweeter.
  - The nations hear the joy in the laughter of God's people and they, too, acknowledge that God has done great things for us.
  - But because we live in a fallen world, this joy will be difficult to maintain until we are in glory.
- Joy requested in hope
  - Two kinds of restoration are asked for here: An instantaneous blessing that brings immediate results, and harvest from long, slow, faithful sowing.
- Sowing and reaping are frequent metaphors in the Bible.
  - The Parable of the Sower (Mark 4:1-20)
  - "You shall reap what you sow" (Galatians 6:7-9)
  - "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless a grain of wheat falls into the earth and dies, it remains alone; but if it dies, it bears much fruit." (John 12:24)
  - "So is it with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable; what is raised is imperishable. 43 It is sown in dishonor; it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness; it is raised in power. 44 It is sown a natural body; it is raised a spiritual body." (I Corinthians 15:42-44)
- Occasionally blessing comes out of nowhere, but often, joy only comes after hard work and much pain and sadness...
- There is no resurrection without death.
- We are frequently troubled by thoughts of despair; for what human being is there who could be without this thought: "What if God did not want you to be saved?" What is God is really not for me? But we are taught that in this conflict we must hold fast to the promise given us in the Gospel, which is sure and clear. But when this happens, Satan does not cease immediately but keeps crying out in your heart that you are not worthy of this promise.
- Of course not. Therefore I take refuge in His promise. And I keep sowing, in hope.
- Lent is for Easter. We're going with Jesus to the cross not as a destination in itself, but because that way lies redemption and resurrection. Jesus redeems. Jesus rises from the dead. And we get life in and through Him. The joyful harvest is sure because the promise is sure.
