# A Worship Study Guide for Individuals, Groups and Families for the week of September 8, 2019

### My Disciple

This week, Steve Shelby preached on Luke 14:25-33

<sup>25</sup> Now great crowds accompanied him, and he turned and said to them, <sup>26</sup> "If anyone comes to me and does not hate his own father and mother and wife and children and brothers and sisters, yes, and even his own life, he cannot be my disciple. <sup>27</sup> Whoever does not bear his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple. <sup>28</sup> For which of you, desiring to build a tower, does not first sit down and count the cost, whether he has enough to complete it? <sup>29</sup> Otherwise, when he has laid a foundation and is not able to finish, all who see it begin to mock

him, <sup>30</sup> saying, 'This man began to build and was not able to finish.' <sup>31</sup> Or what king, going out to encounter another king in war, will not sit down first and deliberate whether he is able with ten thousand to meet him who comes against him with twenty thousand? <sup>32</sup> And if not, while the other is yet a great way off, he sends a delegation and asks for terms of peace. <sup>33</sup> So therefore, any one of you who does not renounce all that he has cannot be my disciple.

- "Great crowds" (25). Jesus is less interested in the size of His following than the heart of His followers
- How do I know if I love someone or something else more than Jesus?
- What is this "cross" (27) that I am required to take up?
- Why this is the most loving thing that Jesus can offer us?
- "Think about what Jesus is actually saying. On the one hand, it is terrifying and unreasonable: in order to gain salvation, life, and reconciliation, you have to lose every amenity, every relationship, every last scrap of the good life you might have. In short, you have to be dead. On the other hand, the deal is a bargain to end all bargains: sooner or later, you're going to have to lose all those things anyway- willy-nilly, the death that is your wherewithal for buying a new world is already in the bank." (Robert Farrar Capon)
- We have the secret to life-- and that secret is death.
- Look at what Jesus says next: "Salt is good, but if salt has lost its taste, how shall its saltiness be restored? It is of no use either for the soil or for the manure pile. It is thrown away. He who has ears to hear, let him hear." (<u>Luke 14:34-35</u>)
- How does salt go with the words about counting the cost?
- The taste, zip and zing that the church at its best can give to the world is the joy and freedom of losing everything to gain everything.
- The Gospel is not a tragedy. The tragedy is not seeing how loss is gain.
